District 24 - Australia (1980-2019)¹

Since 1920, Zonta International has grouped clubs by district. The following is information on the formation of District 24. Today, District 24 has 26 clubs in one state and one territory in Australia

District 24 formed from the division of the original District XVI.

District 24 Historian Joanna Quinn described the formation of District 24 in the district's History in Brief in 2016:

The current District 24 arose from two district divisions. The first was in 1990 at the Dallas convention, when District 16, which had been created in 1974 to provide a district in the Antipodes, was divided into three districts. New Zealand remained as District 16, as [the Zonta Club of] Auckland had been chartered first. Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, Western Australia and the Northern Territory became District 23, as the [Zonta Club of] Melbourne was chartered next. New South Wales, [except for one club that belongs to District 23] Australian Capital Territory and Queensland became District 24.

The second division took place in 2008 at the convention in Rotterdam. As a result of the growth of Queensland, and to make better use of our Federal political system for advocacy purposes, Queensland split from District 24 and was allocated the district number of the disbanded South American district, District 22.

As at May 2016, District 24 had approximately 500 members in metropolitan areas and country towns with clubs that range geographically from Canberra and Berry in the south to Orange in the west and Coffs Harbor in the north.

A new club, Hunter Newcastle, was chartered in April 2014 and another in Goulburn in May 2016.

Most of the clubs in the district have always supported Zonta's international projects to a varying degree, many of them contributing a third of service funds as recommended.

Governors of District 24

• 1990–1992 Marcia Seymour-Dane OAM, Zonta Club of Sydney, New South Wales

- Marcia Dane (deceased) was the first district governor following the creation of District 24 and was installed at the 1990 Zonta International Convention in Dallas.
- The inaugural District 24 Conference was held in September 1991 at Sea World Nara, on the Gold Coast, Queensland. The Zonta International Representative was Zonta International Director, Amy Hung. A total of 33 clubs were represented at the conference with one represented by proxy.

1992–1994 Mary Magee OAM, Zonta Club of Brisbane, Queensland

- Mary was installed as district governor at the 1992 Zonta International Convention in Hong Kong and her district conference was held in September 1993 at New England Girls School, Armidale, NSW, with Zonta International Vice-President Josephine Cooke from the USA as the Zonta International Representative. The theme of the conference was "The Voice of Zonta Shall be Heard in the Land".
- Mary went on to be elected Zonta International President for 2000–2002 at the Zonta International Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, USA in 2000. The theme for Mary's biennium as International President was "Building Zonta in the 21st Century Inspired by the Challenge of Change". During her biennium, Mary appointed Jane Wilson O'Brien, Zonta Club of Redcliffe Inc., to the Zonta International Membership and Classification Committee.
- Mary's passion was membership of Zonta International and she organised and supported many clubs throughout District 24 and across the Zonta world. She had a strong belief that growth of Zonta relied on strong active clubs.

1994–1996 Patricia Logan, Zonta Club of Orange, New South Wales

- The Zonta International Convention in Detroit, USA, in 1994 saw the installation of Patricia as district governor.
- The District 24 Conference in October 1995 was held at the Sheraton on the Park, Sydney. Zonta International Director, Caryle Tsui, was the Zonta International Representative and the conference theme was "New Horizons".

• 1996–1998 Jane Wilson O'Brien, Zonta Club of Redcliffe, Queensland

- The St Louis, Zonta International Convention in Missouri in 1996 was the venue for the installation of Jane as Governor.
- The 1997 District 24 Conference was held at Emmanuel College, University of Queensland, St Lucia, with Zonta International Representative Donna Lane attending and the theme "Zonta Speaks". It was at this conference that the initial motions were passed on the potential division of the district with Queensland clubs forming a new district. This eventually occurred after the Zonta International Convention in Rotterdam in 2008.
- Jane worked closely with Mary Magee in organising and establishing many new clubs throughout District 24.

1998–2000 Glenda Mc-Chesney-Clark, Zonta Club of Brisbane South, Queensland

- O Glenda's Installation occurred at the Zonta International Convention in Paris, France, in 1998. Zonta International Committee appointments during this Biennium were Judith Lamb of the Zonta Club of Armidale (Zonta Rose Task Force), Carla Fasano of the Zonta Club of Wollongong (Amelia Earhart Fellowship Commitee), Christine Gailey of the Zonta Club of Sydney (Bylaws Committee), and Caroline Perkins of the Zonta Club of Canberra (Environment Committee).
- The 1999 District 24 Conference was held at the University of Southern Queensland, Toowoomba. The International Representative was Zonta International Director Janaki Krishnan from India. The theme of the conference was "Changing Gears – Challenging Years".
- A donation from the Zonta International Representative at conference assisted with the development of the first District 24 website which was launched at the end of the biennium. The District 24 Website was recognised with a Public Relations Committee Award at the 2004 Zonta International Convention in New York.

• 2000–2002 Judy Lord, Zonta Club of Tamworth, New South Wales

- The Zonta International Convention in Honolulu in 2000 saw the installation of both Judy Lord as governor and Mary Magee (Zonta Club of Brisbane Inc.) as Zonta International President. Denise Conroy (Zonta Club of Brisbane East Inc.) was appointed to the Zonta International Status of Women Service Committee, Lorna Parker (Zonta Club of Sydney West Inc.) to the Zonta International Young Women in Public Affairs Award Committee, Margaret McMurdo (Zonta Club of Brisbane Inc.) to the Legislative Awareness and Advocacy Committee, and Susan Anderson (Zonta Club of Canberra Inc.) to the Amelia Earhart Fellowship Committee.
- Calrossy School, Tamworth, was the venue for the 2001 District 24 Conference.
 International Representative was Zonta International Director Betty Jane Bourdon from the USA and the conference theme was: "Building Zonta with Innovation, Interaction and Inspiration".

2002–2004 Robyn Gaspari, Zonta Club of Nepean Valley, New South Wales

- The Zonta International Convention in Gothenburg, Sweden saw Robyn installed as governor. Zonta International Committee appointments were Lorna Parker (Zonta Club of Sydney West Inc.) to the Young Women in Public Affairs Awards Committee, Judy Lord (Zonta Club of Tamworth) to the Public Relations Committee, and Denise Conroy (Zonta Club of Brisbane East Inc.) to the Status of Women Service Committee and as Coordinator of the Legislative Awareness and Advocacy Committee.
- Ms Ann Silvester (deceased) from the Zonta Club of Sydney Inc. became a Director of the Zonta International Foundation.
- The district conference in 2003 was held at the Novotel Hotel, Brighton-le-Sands, Sydney with the Theme "Bridging the Gaps". Zonta International Director Beryl Sten from Sweden was the Zonta International Representative.

2004–2006 Ros Kinder, Zonta Club of Brisbane East, Queensland

 Ros was installed at the Zonta International Convention in New York in 2004. Ann Silvester (deceased) from the Zonta Club of Sydney Inc was President of the Zonta

- International Foundation Board. Jane Wilson O'Brien (Zonta Club of Northside Inc.) was elected to the Zonta International Nominating Committee and appointed to the Young Women in Public Affairs Award Sub-committee.
- With the theme "Zonta Making a Difference" the district conference was held in October 2005 at the Crowne Plaza, Surfers Paradise. Zonta International Representative was Zonta International Director Dandy Gomez from the Philippines. The conference was officially opened by the then Governor of Queensland and later Honorary Zontian, Dame Quentin Bryce AC. A record of over 300 delegates from 63 clubs attended this district conference.

• 2006–2008 Patricia Lawson, Zonta Club of Sydney Hills, New South Wales

- Patricia was installed as Governor at the 2006 Melbourne, Australia, Zonta International Convention hosted by Zontians from District 23 with assistance from Districts 16 and 24.
- In 2007 Zonta International Director Bonny Schumacher from the USA was the Zonta International Representative at the District 24 Conference held at Twin Towns Services Club, Tweed Heads. The theme was "Looking Back – Looking Forward".
- It was at this conference that delegates voted to again request that the Zonta International Board agree to a division of District 24, with further information provided to the Zonta International Board to give more weight to the request from members.

2008–2010 Olivia Sarah le Lacheur, Zonta Club of Sydney Breakfast, New South Wales

- As the inaugural district governor of the new District 24, Olivia was installed at the 2008 Zonta International Convention in Rotterdam, Holland.
- Old Parliament House, Canberra, ACT was the venue for the 2009 District 24
 Conference with the theme "Collaborating through Service and Advocacy to Advance
 the Status of Women". Zonta International Representative was Zonta International
 Treasurer Gloria Stootman Wristen from the USA.
- Conference approved that the district become a registered Incorporated Association. The district became an Incorporated Association (INC9892087) effective 21 September 2009.

2010–2012 Carolyn Evans, Zonta Club of Botany Bay, New South Wales

- The Installation of Carolyn Evans as Governor of District 24 took place at the 2010
 Zonta International Convention held in San Antonio, Texas.
- Zonta International Board member Kathleen Douglass was the Zonta International Representative at the 2011 district conference held at The Glasshouse Arts Conference & Entertainment Centre, Port Macquarie, NSW.

2012–2014 Kerry Bigsworth, Zonta Club of Sydney, New South Wales

- The Installation of Kerry Bigsworth as Governor of District 24 took place at the 2012
 Zonta International Convention held in Torino, Italy.
- District conference was held at the Crowne Plaza in Terrigal, NSW in 2013. Theme
 was "Inspiring Women Credible and Visible" with Zonta International Director Maria
 Stefanova from the Republic of Bulgaria attending as the Zonta International
 Representative.

2014–2016 Margaret Bateman, Zonta Club of Port Macquarie, New South Wales

- Margaret was installed as Governor of District 24 at the 2014 Zonta International Convention held in Orlando, Florida, USA.
- Charles Sturt University, Orange, NSW was the venue for the 2015 District 24 Conference. This was attended by 116 registrations, a record since division of the district in 2008. The International Representative was Zonta International Director Sally Bean from the USA and the Theme "Empowering Women Together". The district's governing documents, including the constitution, were updated by conference.

2016–2018 Janette Curtis, Zonta Club of Wollongong, New South Wales

- Janette was installed as Governor of District 24 at the 2016 Zonta International Convention held in Nice, France.
- In September 2017 the District 24 Conference was held at Noah's On the Beach, Newcastle, NSW. The International Representative was Zonta International Director Ute Scholz from Germany and the conference theme was "Leading the Way".

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2018–2020 Sharyl Scott, Zonta Club of Macarthur, New South Wales

- Sharyl was installed as Governor at the Zonta International Convention in 2018 in Yokohama, Japan. At the convention, District 24 Zontian, Margaret Bateman, was elected as a Director of the Zonta International and Zonta International Foundation Boards.
- The 2019 conference from 6 to 8 September was a combined conference of District 16 (New Zealand) and Districts 22, 23 and 24 (Australia). The conference, held at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre, brought together the original District XVI Areas. More than 800 Zontians attended, including Zonta International and Zonta International Foundation President. Dr Susanne von Bassewitz.

District 24 service projects

- At the distinct conference in Tamworth in 2001 the district endorsed the making of breast care cushions for women and men recovering from breast cancer surgery, as a district project. This project was an initiative of Ann Selle OAM of the Zonta Club of Botany Bay Club Inc. It has been endorsed at every subsequent district conference and has now been adopted by many districts around the Zonta world. Clubs in District 24 are now supplying cushions to most of the hospitals in the district. With the support of her club, Zonta Club of Botany Bay, Ann has arranged funding for a training program for breast care nurses in Colombo, Sri Lanka.
- The assembly of birthing kits was formally endorsed as a district project at the District 24 Conerence in 2005, and has been re-endorsed at every conference since. Birthing kit assembly was originally a project of the Zonta Club of Adelaide Hills, started by District 23 Zontian, Dr Julie Monis Ivett. It is is now the Birthing Kit Foundation of Australia Inc.
- In the 2008–2010 biennium, the district endorsed as a district project the Sydney-based Trafficking & Slavery Safe House (formerly Samaritan House). This was supported only for one biennium.²

 Clubs have supported and/or funded women's refuges, women leaving gaol, drought relief, charitable organisations, hospitals and organisations committed to empowering women and advancing their status both at home in Australia and overseas, as well as being active in Advocacy in Women's issues both at State, Territory and Federal Level.

District 24 advocacy initiatives

The district has been active in advocacy for women's issues at both the state and federal levels. District 24 joined the Equality Rights Alliance (ERA) and Economic Security for Women (eS4W) in 2011. ERA and eS4W are two of six federally-funded women's alliances to advise the Australian government on policies relating to women.

Clubs have also supported and continue to support International Women's Day with community functions, some of which are, and have been, in conjunction with UN Women, the White Ribbon campaigns and the Zonta says NO to Violence Against Women campaign.

District 24 Inc initiatives include:

- Input into a submission prepared by the Australian Women's Coalition on the review of the federal Equal Opportunity for Women in the Workplace Act and Agency
- Supporting the rollout of 10 "Advocacy" Workshops across Australia, by co-coordinating
 the registrations, catering, venue and facilitator. Over 220 women from NGOs and
 grassroots women's organisations participated. The workshops were presented by the
 Public Interest Advocacy Centre (PIAC), funded by the Office for Women, and supported
 by the Australian Medical Association (AMA), AWC and Zonta International District 24
- Submission into the National Women's Health Policy review
- Submission to the National Human Rights Consultation
- Personal presentation and written submission to the Productivity Commission inquiry into Paid Parental Leave
- Contributions to commentaries/submissions on such issues as a new Antidiscrimination Bill, a Productivity Commission Inquiry into Childcare and Early Learning, the Federal Government's proposed changes to the Workplace Gender Equality Regulations, an online workplace negotiation checklist for women, and recommendations about priorities for the 2013/14 and 2014/2015 Federal Budgets
- Within NSW, working with the Women's Electoral Lobby to provide commentary on the NSW Government's statistical publication Women in NSW, and joined with a range of other not-for-profits (NFPs) to provide advice to the NSW Minister for Women on the future role of NFPs in reducing the impact of violence against women
- Under the Lifelong Economic Wellbeing for Women in Australia (LLEWA) project, the revision of four discussion papers based on the research findings on the Care Economy, Divorce/Separation, Domestic Violence impact on work and women's income in later life (retirements)
- Submission to the Department of the Attorney-General concerning the proposed changes to the Federal Criminal Code re the trafficking of women
- Attending the 2015 Annual National Women's Alliances Forum "Looking Back, Looking Forward" 15–16 June 2015 in Canberra.

District Awards

- The district has supported the International Young Women in Public Affairs Awards and the Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarships and several District 24 winners have become International winners.
- Between 2012 and 2014, the district piloted the Achievement Award for a Young Indigenous Women (ZAAYIW), an award designed to recognize and celebrate the achievements of young Indigenous women currently enrolled in Year 12 who have made a marked contribution to the life of their school community through one or more of their service leadership initiatives. Four awards were made under the pilot scheme and the award was made a district project at the district conference in 2015. The awards are designed to complement the Young Women in Public Affairs Award3
- Clubs in the district have supported and/or funded Scholarships, prizes and awards for women and girls in both traditional and non-traditional fields at schools, TAFE and Universities and in the community.

Z Clubs in District 24

Z Clubs have been formed in the district since 2002. The Shoalhaven High Club, supported by the Zonta Club of Beery Inc. has closed leaving five active Z Clubs across the district.

Young Women in Public Affairs Award and Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarships

The district has had several YWPA winners who went on to be winners at international level, as well as one Jane M. Klausman Young Women in Business Scholarship winner.

Club scholarships, prizes and awards

Clubs have supported or funded scholarships, prizes and awards for women and girls in both traditional and non-traditional fields at schools, TAFEs (Colleges of Technical and Further Education) and universities. Clubs have also supported or funded women's refuges, women leaving prison, made donations to drought relief, charitable organizations and hospitals and committed to empowering women and advancing their status both in Australia and overseas.

Honorary District Members

The district has recognized significant local women by awarding Honorary District Membership. Marian Baird of Sydney University, who has made an outstanding long term and sustained contribution to the status of women through her research in the field of women and work, was awarded the most recent honorary membership. Additionally, Lindsay Cane, CEO of the Far

West Children, an NGO providing health services to children living in rural and remote NSW. was also awarded.

International Honorary Members

District 24 has made recommendations for several International Honorary Members, the latest being Anne Gallagher AO, a lawyer, teacher and scholar with a significant reputation in human rights and the administration of criminal justice. She received her International Honorary Membership at the Zonta Club of Sydney Inc.'s 50th anniversary dinner in May 2016. Unfortunately, she was unable to attend the Nice convention as she was in Myanmar working on human trafficking laws.

Zonta International Foundation

Clubs in the district have supported Zonta International Service Projects to varying degrees, many of them contributing 1/3 of Service funds as recommended.

Timeline of district history highlights

While the current Zonta Club of Sydney Inc., club no. 557, was chartered in 1966, there had been an early Sydney Club chartered in 1930, club no. 109.4 It was one of the first clubs outside of the United States and Canada and had been organized by American Zontian, Dr. Slaughter-Morton, who was married to a doctor practising in Sydney. This club at first formed part of District VII, with clubs in Texas, Colorado, California and Hawaii, however in 1931 it is listed as a non-districted club together with Hamburg, Vienna and Honolulu. Club presidents are recorded to 1934; however, the club seems to have gone out of existence in 1935 and there is no explanation of its failure.⁵

The early Australian clubs were non-districted and, as of 1970, managed as part of Zonta International Area III, the Asia-Pacific Area.

1972: In April, 13 Australian and New Zealand Zonta clubs met in Sydney for the first Area 03 Workshop and advised International President-Elect Harriette Yeckel that they were ready to form a district.

Area III Asia Pacific became Region III Asia Pacific at the Portland convention and on 2 July 1972, the Zonta International Board agreed that Region III was to be granted district status.

1974: The existence of District XVI for clubs in Australia and New Zealand was formally declared at a pre-convention meeting of the Zonta International Board in Boston in the United States. By 1974, there were 18 clubs in Region III.

1990: District 24 was established as one of the successor districts to District XVI, comprising clubs in Queensland. New South Wales (apart from club number 1227, the Zonta Club of Albury-Wodonga, which belonged to District 23), and the Australian Capital Territory.

1993: There were four areas.

1994: 57 clubs organized in seven areas:

- Area 01 had ten clubs.
- Area 02 had eight clubs.
- Area 03 had 14 clubs.
- Area 04 had seven clubs.
- Area 05 had five clubs.
- Area 06 had six clubs.
- Area 07 with seven clubs.

1998: 66 clubs organized in seven areas.

2002: 73 clubs organized in nine areas.

2006: 76 clubs in eight areas.

2008: Further growth in clubs and membership in District 24 led to a decision at the Rotterdam convention to divide District 24 into two districts: District 22 and District 24.

Growth in clubs and membership in District 24 led to the decision at the 2008 Zonta International Convention in Rotterdam to divide District 24 into two districts:

- District 22 would be for clubs in Queensland and the Zonta Club of Northern Rivers of New South Wales, because of its proximity to the Queensland border
- District 24 would be for clubs in the Australian Capital Territory and New South Wales. The Zonta Club of Albury-Wodonga, on the border of New South Wales and Victoria, had been in District 23 since 1990 and opted to remain.

2008: 27 clubs organized in three areas.

2016: 25 clubs in three areas.

2018: 489 members.⁷

2019: 653 members as of 16 July.8
