

Chapter 9

District 05 - North America.1

Since 1920, Zonta International has grouped clubs by district. The following is information on the formation of District 05. Today, District 05 has 17 clubs in three states in the United States

The history of District 05 dates back to 1919 with the founding of the Zonta Club of Detroit, Michigan, which was one of the nine clubs that organized the Confederation of Zonta Clubs in November 1919.

Henrietta Rosenthal, charter member of the Zonta Club of Detroit, wrote the first parts of the history of District V. She attended the organizing meeting of the Convention of Zonta Clubs in 1919 and wrote the first Confederation Bylaws. The next parts of the District V history, through 1989, were written by Audra Francis from the Zonta Club of Saginaw, Michigan, and Marjorie Wilson from the Zonta Club of Toledo, Ohio. Club histories are posted on the district website.

District conferences

The first conference of District 05 (then District V) was held in Toledo, Ohio, in 1947.

There was much discussion, pro et con, regarding important issues of the time: the Marshall Plan, European Relief and Rehabilitation, etc. It was decided that since Zonta was an international organization, members should let their governments (Canada and the USA) know how they felt.²

The discussion continued for the next two years with the conference themes "Zonta's Place in the Community of the World" in 1948 and "Is Zonta important in today's world?" in 1949.

The Cold War was reflected in the 1951 district conference theme, "How Can Zonta Help in Civil Defense and Other Civil Projects?". There was also a keynote speech with the title, "Where Zonta's money comes from and where it goes".

Overall, district conference themes in the 1950s were international friendship, women's heritage and responsibility. In 1952, each club was given the name of an overseas club to contact with newsletters, letters, etc. In 1953, the district "voted to approve the recommendation from the Zonta International Board for international representation at convention (a per capita tax of USD\$0.15 per member in districted clubs)" (Marjorie C. Wilson, District V History, p.16).

In 1954, "Let's Grow in Understanding, in Fellowship, in Service" was the theme and in 1956, "Zonta Builds for the World of Tomorrow".

In 1958, the conference theme was "Zonta Opens the Door to World Friendship through Service" and during this year, members were urged to attend the European Congress held in Copenhagen from 23 May to 1 June the following year. Norway was the district's friendship country.

In 1961, "Towards the Light, Zonta Beckons and Builds with Beacons and Bridges" was the theme; others during the 1960s included "Expanding Dimensions" (meaning expansion of Zonta in the USA) and "Overseas and International Friendship".

The Eva Mowbray Hostess Fund was established in 1962 by District V in honor of Eva Mowbray, a Zontian in London, England, who hosted many visiting Zontians at her home. The following year, Zonta International President Ellen Harris adopted the idea and proposed honoring Eva Mowbray by naming a Zonta International voluntary-contribution hostess fund after her.

In 1961, the district conference transferred USD\$500.00 from the District Reserve Fund to the District Organization Fund. A further USD\$500.00 was designated for organization of a Zonta club in Istanbul, Turkey, further to an organization survey which indicated that such an initiative was warranted. In 1963, the Zonta Club of Istanbul in Turkey was welcomed by Zonta International as a new club, with their fees and dues paid to Zonta International by the Zonta Club of Flint, Michigan, as a service project.

In 1966, a District Luncheon was attended by 16 Finnish Zontians.

In 1976, the district conference theme was "Hats OFF to Zontians Past, Present, Future." The importance of attending the district conferences was underlined by the new Governor's Attendance Trophy awarded to the club that had the largest number of members at the conference and had travelled the greatest distance to attend.

In 1978, when the theme was "The Voice of Zonta Shall Be Heard Throughout the World," Eleanor Jammal, the Zonta International UN Committee chair, addressed the conference concerning Zonta's role as an NGO at the UN.

In 1981, the keynote speech themes at the conference were "Zonta's role in the '80s – Something New in the '80s", and "The Future: is it Security or Want?".

Service projects

Clubs in District 05 have a long tradition of local service projects focusing on girls' and women's education, and of donating considerable sums towards Amelia Earhart Fellowships.

In 1948, 152 acres of wooded land was donated for a Girl Scout camp and donations were made for an International House for international students at The Ohio State University.

In 1987, the service project of the Zonta Club of Marietta in Ohio recognized academic excellence of students graduating with high honors. They were recognized at a special banquet and were given the opportunity to acknowledge the teacher who had been most influential in their achievements.

The Zonta Club of Sandusky had an interest-free student loans program from 1973 to 1981.

Sponsoring Z Clubs was on the agenda of more than one club throughout the district.

Impressive donations were given to nursing homes and hospitals, with Zontians often giving their time to help as well.

Clubs have also been devoted to fighting violence against women for many years.

The Zonta Club of Sandusky focused on projects helping naturalized citizens in 1971, 1974, 1980 and 1981.

However, not all service projects focused on girls and women. The following projects focused on the community as a whole:

- Maple Heights Centennial (1982)
- Bedford Garden Club (1985)
- Maple Heights Historical Society (1986)
- Local Fountain in downtown Defiance (1989)
- Trees and barrels for Woodland.

In 1950, District 05 gave a special donation of USD\$100.00 to Zonta International for the purchase of a filing cabinet.

Timeline of district history highlights.

Organization and extension were the most important focus for the district in the 1920s and 1930s.

1924: The following clubs were referred to as the Western District:

- Zonta Club of Detroit, Michigan (club number 0009)
- Zonta Club of Toledo, Ohio (club number 0013)
- Zonta Club of Cleveland, Ohio (club number 0014)
- Zonta Club of Grand Rapids Area, Michigan (club number 0015)
- Zonta Club of Lansing, Michigan (club number 0016)
- Zonta Club of Flint I, Michigan (club number 0025)
- Zonta Club of Ann Arbor, Michigan (club number 0030)

The District Plan was revised. Effective from 1925, the original three districts became five, designated as A, B, C, D and E.³

1928: Clubs were referred to as District D, which comprised 26 clubs.

1929: District Plan was reviewed. District D became District II Region A for clubs in Michigan and Ohio, and District II Region B for clubs in Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin.

1930: Clubs were referred to as District II, Region A.

1936: 16 clubs. Clubs were referred to as District II, Region A.

1946: 18 clubs. Clubs were still referred to as District II, Region A.

1947: District V was created as part of a large re-districting. The organizing meeting was held in Toledo, Ohio.

Clubs were from Ohio, Michigan and Western Ontario. (Clubs from Kentucky would join the district in 1960.) The new District V encompassed 18 clubs.

1949: 940 members.4

1951: 1,035 members.

1952: 27 clubs; nine in Ohio, 15 in Michigan and three in Ontario, Canada.

1953: 29 clubs and 1,253 members.

1957: 34 clubs (ten in Ohio, 21 in Michigan and three in Ontario, Canada).

1958: 1.635 members.

1960: At the District V Conference, the continuation of the Area Director Plan was adopted for two years including the increase of USD\$0.50 per capita dues.

1962: 49 clubs and 1,957 members.

After a three-year trial, the Area Director Plan became permanent and four area directors were elected. District dues were increased to include an additional USD\$0.50 to cover Area Director expenses. District dues now equaled USD\$1.50.

1967: 2,136 members.

1968: 50 clubs and 2,064 members.

District V voted to divide into two districts. Permission was granted by the Zonta International Board.

1970: The division was effective from the Fall Conference in Toledo, Ohio. District V was divided into:

- District V a; comprised of 30 clubs in Michigan and Western Ontario and 1,256 members
- District V b, comprised of 20 clubs in Ohio and Kentucky and 808 members. The clubs in Northwest West Virginia, which belonged to District IV, petitioned to become part of District V b and they were welcomed into the new district.

1971: District V b encompassed 22 clubs (two from Kentucky, 18 from Ohio and two from West Virginia). There were two areas.

1972: The International Board decided that all District- numbers were to be written solely in Roman numerals.

- District V a became District XV, comprising clubs in Michigan and Western Ontario. (See separate history of District XV for developments after this point.)
- District V b became District V, comprising clubs in Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia.

1974: 23 clubs organized in two areas.

1976: At the district conference, delegates from Area 01 voted to divide the area into two. The division was effective from the beginning of the 1978–80 biennium, taking the number of areas to three from that date.⁵

1978: District V dues increased from USD\$2.50 to USD\$4.50.

1980: District V comprised 25 clubs organized in three areas.⁶

1981: The 25 clubs were divided into four areas:⁷

- Area 1 was in Northwest Ohio (Northern Ohio from Lorain, west to the Indiana line, and south to Findlay). It included seven clubs.
- Area 2 was in Southwest Ohio and Kentucky (Commonwealth of Kentucky and the western section of Ohio to the eastern boundary of Route 23). It included six clubs.
- Area 3 was in Northeast Ohio (Northern Ohio east of Lorain to the Pennsylvania line, and south to Youngstown/Warren). It included seven clubs.
- Area 4 was in Central/Southeastern Ohio and West Virginia (State of West Virginia and Ohio east of Route 23). It included five clubs.

1982: District V dues were USD\$7.00 per capita per year.

1990: The Zonta International Board changed the designation from Roman to Arabic numerals; District V became District 05.

27 clubs and 1,009 members.8

1993: 24 clubs.

1995: 23 clubs.

2002: 20 clubs in four areas (Area 01 – seven clubs, Area 02 – five clubs, Area 03 – four clubs, and Area 04 – four clubs).

2012: The last club in West Virginia was disbanded.

2016–2018: 17 clubs (three in Kentucky and 14 in Ohio) and 467 members. In 2017 the Zonta Club of Marietta & Environs changed its name to The Zonta Club of Mid-Ohio Valley to encompass members living in West Virginia.

In 2018 District agreed to change its borders between Area 2 and Area 4 to balance membership between the two areas. The Zonta Club of Springfield became part of Area 4 effective 1 June, 2019.

2019: 381 members.

History of formation of District 05 clubs

As of June 2019, Area 01 had five clubs and Areas 02, 03 and 04 each had four clubs.
